NATIONAL POVERTY SPEAKER



On April 4th, keynote speaker, Dr. Donna Beegle, told an inspiring story of moving from 28 years of homelessness to achieving a doctorate as she educated those in attendance on poverty.

Donna spoke to 500 community members in 4 sessions, as well as 125 high school students. Attendees from local governments, businesses, faith organizations, human service agencies, health care agencies, education professionals, and compassionate community members participated in the day's sessions. The energy, support, and

conversations from those in attendance have been truly inspiring.

"I think the most moving part of the day was when Donna asked the high school students if they had ever seen their mothers or grandmothers go hungry. The significant level of affirmations from these young people was a stark reminder of the real opportunities before us." stated Charla Schafer.

EVERYONE SLEEPS... THE QUESTION IS WHERE?

When my son was two years old, we had a very dedicated nighttime routine. We would give him a bath, get him in his jammies, snuggle in bed, read the same book repeatedly, and talk about his day and our plans for tomorrow. Then we would kiss him good night. Invariably, 20 minutes later we would find him asleep in the hall.

As a new parent, I called my mother-in-law in desperation recounting our toddler's sleep patterns. Having raised 10 children of her own, she responded rather directly, "Do you know any adults that sleep in the hall?" I sheepishly replied "No." She abruptly concluded the conversation with, "Then QUIT worrying about it."



Aww, the wisdom. I had worried about where this little fella chose to sleep in our own home. The more I learn about local homelessness, the more ridiculous and short-sighted that seems.

For many in our community, the question of where their children will sleep is an overwhelming daily reality. Last year Muscatine Center for Social Action (MCSA) housed 310 people from our community that were temporarily homeless, including 79 children.

MCSA is privileged to work with the individuals and families who reach out to us for service, but that is just a fraction of those in need. Studies show that for every one child in a shelter, there are five more that are homeless: couch-hopping or living in an uninhabitable location. For these families, the opportunity for their toddler to fall asleep in the hallway of their own home is a distant dream.

In 2016, MCSA also worked with an additional 227 households (2% of all Muscatine households) with 334 children who were on the verge of homelessness.

A common cliché is people should just work a bit harder. However, Communications Across Barriers reports that two-thirds of adults in poverty work an average of 1.7 jobs according to the 2010 census.

So what is the leading cause of homelessness? Lack of affordable housing. As a rule of thumb you should not pay more than 30% of your income for housing. We routinely see people paying 60% to 80% of their income for housing, leaving little left for anything else. These folks are a small financial hiccup away from homelessness. Or, we see three or four families living together trying to keep their children sheltered. What we do know is living doubled and tripled up is not beneficial, and often is not safe for children.

It has been shown that every move a child makes, due to housing instability, can cause an academic set back of up to 6 months, and affect the entire classroom. Poverty is the single biggest threat to a child's well-being, and unfortunately, it is often coupled with housing insecurity.

So I tried to determine how many affordable housing units our community may be short - if 15% of Muscatine residents are reported to be in poverty, you could then assume roughly 1,350 households are poverty stricken. And, the number of subsidized units in our community is shy of 800, leaving a shortage of more than 500 "affordable" housing units.

However, to paint a truer picture, only households in 490 of those 800 subsidized units are guaranteed to not pay more than 40% of their income for housing at the time they move in. The remaining 300+ households may continue to be extremely cost burdened (paying 50% or more for housing) to live in these "affordable" units.

So what is the affordable housing answer? It may not be simple or clear, but I don't believe it is an issue that my mother-in-law or anyone else in our community would dismiss by telling us to "QUIT worrying about it".

It's that time of year, time to get school supplies, time to make sure your immunizations are up-to-date, and it's time to see the dentist. Did you know that kindergarteners and 9th graders in Iowa are required to have a dental examination prior to the start of school? We have these forms readily available at the University of Iowa Dental Clinic at MCSA. School-aged children aren't the only ones that need a dental examination, but Head Start and Early Head Start preschoolers also require an examination. Pediatric dental faculty, pediatric residents, and senior dental students all see patients at MCSA every Tuesday and Thursday from 9-4 and provide comprehensive dental care to children birth through 18. For children requiring more advanced dental care in other areas, we are able to refer them to specialists at the University of Iowa, College of Dentistry.


We know that dental cavities are the number one untreated disease among school-aged children. It is more common than asthma and hay fever. We want to make sure that every child goes to school without a toothache. For this reason, we provide dental services to children in the Muscatine Pediatric Dentistry Clinic at a reduced fee. We also accept insurance including Iowa Medicaid for children. Our goal is that every child in the area have a Dental Home by age 1. This means that a dentist provides oral health care in a comprehensive, continuously accessible, coordinated, and family-centered way. We do that by providing routine care here in Muscatine Tuesday's and Thursday's and we are available for emergencies 24 hours a day 7 days a week by contacting the University of Iowa, College of Dentistry during work hours and the University of Iowa Hospital and Clinics during afterhours and weekends.

So, when you are getting everything prepared for back to school, make sure to schedule a back-to-school dental examination and cleaning by calling 563-263-0895 at MCSA or any other dental provider in the area.
